ARTS WITH IMPACT

ARCK's Arts With Impact framework provides the foundation for the following programs and initiatives:

CREATORS PROGRAM

ARCK's Creators Program is a 36 week push-in program taught by ARCK Teaching Artists that focuses on creativity as the tool for interdisciplinary academic success. Built on a three module framework (Self-Awareness, Community, and Social Justice) that addresses a series of fundamental questions through progressive hands-on projects, the Creators Program develops core creative competencies in abstraction, contextualization, critical processing, synthesis of knowledge, universal mindset, and communication. Students develop an Integrated Creative Mindset, using the skills of Social Emotional and Relational Awareness and the lens of Social Justice and Equity to learn how to affect positive change in the world.

EDUCATOR TRAINING

ARCK works directly with Districts, Schools, and Educators to provide Integrated Creativity Professional Development for certified teachers, in which we prepare arts and classroom teachers to approach creativity as both a process and a mindset for achieving holistic learning. Teachers learn, employ, and develop strategies and tools to successfully implement curricula integrating critical creativity into STEM, ELA, and Social Science content areas through a mindset rooted in interdisciplinary process-based learning. Using the Core Ideologies embedded in ARCK's Arts with Impact Framework, as well as foundational tools such as Universal Design for Learning, participants learn best practices for arts integration and build capacity to develop their own content to ensure the relevance of creative integration.

BUILDING BRIDGES

Through Artists-in-Residence programs, extracurricular programs, panel discussions, creativity workshops, family engagement activities, community public art projects, sponsor events, and policy initiatives, ARCK broadens the understanding of the importance of creativity in education and promotes civic engagement and access to art for all.



NAVIGATING THE PANDEMIC...

Class began and my camera was the only one on.

"How's everybody doing today?" I asked to a silent room of students I did not know. "Ready for ARCK?"



I began to introduce myself. A few students wrote in the chat, "Hi Ms. Sammy!:-)" I was grateful for them, but their messages were private, visible only to me. The other 15 students, most of whom were at home learning on borrowed BPS ChromeBooks, had no idea if their classmates were present or engaged. It hadn't occurred to me before teaching middle school students over Zoom, in the midst of a pandemic, that silence could be visual.

When I was granted access to share my screen by the classroom teacher, also at home and teaching via Zoom, I presented the slides I'd prepared. "Today we'll begin a 4-week project on comics," I explained. "Everyone will get to create a superhero character and write their own story." As I explained the project, I scrolled through examples by other artists, aiming to spark creative energy in the room.

"Who recognizes this character?" I asked.

"Spiderman," said three students at once, their audio interrupting each other. The chat filled with the same response.

"Nice. How about this character?"

Again, the room briefly filled with student voices - both auditory and written. Then, as I explained the day's artistic task, the voices went silent again. We had plenty of time for independent work, so I played music as I coaxed students to share. When time was up, I said goodbye and had no idea if anyone had done anything at all related to the project. Teaching art, as I had done for over a decade, had been, until this year, kinetic and loud. In an unimaginable year of COVID, hybrid learning, and the reduction of an entire school community into the small boxes of Zoom, art was suddenly silent and still. The lesson I planned for our first month of ARCK involved each student choosing an animal to morph with themselves and their qualities, constructing a hybrid self-portrait and bioinspired character. Over the next four weeks, I planned for students to design their character's costume, storyline, and personality into a fullfledged comic, and practice the skills of self-inquiry, attention, creativity, and suspended belief. They'd learn the ins and outs of comic design, including framing and narrative suspense, and design standards in speech, thought bubbles, onomatopoeia, and motion lines. Students would merge their knowledge of biology, English Language Arts, drama, and pop culture through a systematic and well-paced project. But on day one, I realized I was going to be teaching this lesson without any of the energetic feedback I was used to. My lessons would have to morph to meet the new needs of online learning. Over the next 3 months, our lessons became a laboratory of instructional experimentation. We tried break-out rooms, in which the classroom teacher and I worked with students individually in private Zoom rooms. We asked students what they wanted to learn. We invited students to share whatever they were working on, even if it wasn't the day's project. When schedules changed (3 times!) as the school accommodated hybrid

hybrid and then in-person learning, we tried learning at different times of the day: lunch break on Wednesdays, after school on Fridays, Thursday mornings. I introduced myself again and again, and settled into a new rhythm with each new crew. In all of my classes, I noticed that students were silent until they felt a real connection with the adults and other kids in the room. This made sense! How can anyone be creative and share what they create into a blank and muted Zoom void? So I used fewer PowerPoint presentations and spent more time getting to know the kids. I played music while students made their artwork. I took the grand ideas of my curriculum - so promising when conceptual, when every student had their ARCKits and were awake, present, and engaged - and assumed that each week needed to stand alone. Because, as we well knew, attendance wasn't consistent, and neither was the schedule. If a project was slated to take 3 weeks, it soon became 5, giving students the flexibility to create, conceptualize, and take their time. And they began to show interest! Students were allowed, for one hour per week, to slow down, take the pressure off, and simply create. The chat became a vibrant community dialogue.

"Wow, that looks so good!" one student wrote to another, after he turned his camera on to show off the self-portrait he had drawn.

"That really looks like you," another added.

Someone wrote, "I don't know how to make my nose."

"I don't know how to make sculptures with paper," one student wrote in the chat.

"Ugh, I'm giving up," one student said during a mobile project about balance and construction.

At each of these comments, peers spoke up with support and I stepped in to problem solve. **To** me, this was solid gold: an opportunity to teach a new skill to a student in the midst of self-doubt, but open enough to share how they needed support.

Most students remained off-camera and muted during hybrid learning. The ability to turn it all off - even if present on the other side of the screen - was a necessary level of control in a distressingly out-of-control circumstance. When BPS eased restrictions on in-person learning with only 7 weeks left in the year, over half of the students went back into socially-distanced and fully-masked classrooms with teachers they had never met. ARCK's Teaching Artists were not allowed in the buildings, so our instruction continued over Zoom. It was a new rhythm to adjust to - some students at home, others in the classroom; some using their voices, others using the chat; some wearing masks and sitting in front of computers at desks 6-feet apart, and some without masks on their beds at home. This was the first time that the TAs saw some students' faces on screen. As the year went on and students grew comfortable with their teachers and peers, they started sharing the most beautiful

pieces of art. Sometimes a student, who hadn't spoken in weeks and who I didn't know was even present in class, would turn her camera on and reveal a fully formed, hugely detailed creation.

#ARCKITS

In response to the COVID-19 pandemic, ARCK provided nearly 600 students with an "ARCKit," a custom art bag with all the materials needed to complete our creative lessons from home. As many students did not have access to art supplies typically provided in the classroom, this initiative resulted in an overwhelmingly positive response from students, families, classroom teachers, and school administrators alike. Building on this success, ARCK plans to continue this initiative next year as well, despite the return to physical classrooms.

NEW TEAM

To meet the growing demand for our programs, ARCK has exponentially increased our professional staff capacity in the past year. Since September 2020, we brought in three full-time team members, including our Director of Creative Programs, Lead Teacher & Curriculum Developer, and Operations Manager, as well as part-time Development and Marketing support staff. Additionally, we hired an entirely new team of Teaching Artists in the midst of the COVID-19 pandemic to deliver our Creators Program remotely this year. These individuals have worked tirelessly to ensure ARCK's success as we enter the next phase in our organization's life cycle!

NEW PARTNERSHIPS

This year, ARCK established many new partnerships that aid us in effectively delivering, evaluating, and expanding our programs.


Piccles, "a virtual engagement tool powered by creativity and simplicity" and its leader Chris Bent, has donated time and resources to help ARCK's Teaching Artists keep kids engaged in remote learning this year through fun, interactive, and virtual drawing activities! They were also a hit feature at two events this year!

Boston After School and Beyond, through a partnership with **United Way** and the **BoSTEM** Initiative, assists ARCK in evaluating our Creators Program through both qualitative and quantitative methods. Boston Beyond compiles attendance data, student and teacher survey responses, and formal APT observation reports, and provides ARCK with a comprehensive evaluation of our programs to help determine both success and areas requiring improvement.

Lesley University partners with ARCK to provide consulting services as we develop our Educator Training program, as well as offer graduate art education credit and Professional Development certification for classroom teachers who will participate in our PD Program.

Operation P.E.A.C.E. (Partnerships in Education And Community Enrichment) has become a core Community Partner of ARCK's, as we jointly launch a new Outdoor Summer Enrichment program for students and also collaborate to co-host *Together Through Art*, an outdoor Public Art Walk and Festival.

Artisan's Asylum in Allston will partner with ARCK to help expand and complement our Creators Program and Building Bridges programs starting in the 2021-22 school year.




