Founded in 2012, ARCK uses art as a vehicle to engage underserved Boston Public Schools K-8 students in academics, innovation, and social impact projects. Our trained teaching artists and classroom teachers work together to offer weekly in-school arts integration for 36 weeks, free of charge. Our lessons promote social-emotional skills such as emotion management, collaboration, and empathy, and emphasize environmental sustainability through projects using recycled products in creative ways.

Our mission is to empower students with high-quality arts education that fosters culture and community while supporting schools' learning objectives.

ARCK's vision is to fill the gap in creative learning not offered through traditional education, enabling students of all backgrounds and abilities to reach their full potential. A large body of research shows positive correlations between arts exposure and both academic achievement and development of social-emotional skills. Our curriculum is designed with the personal integrity, cultural background, ethnic origin, and language orientation of the individual student in mind. In a safe and inclusive environment, we strike a balance between creative exploration and mutual respect, encouraging students to engage fully as individual artists and as social beings who can collaborate and help one another. We encourage students to express themselves freely in response to thematic and formal prompts, knowing that the finished products will bear recognizable similarities that form a cohesive whole.

ARCK's signature program explores children's identity via art. Our carefully-designed 36-week curriculum consists of three modules that explore individual identity (Leadership module), community participation (Civic Engagement module), and social and global awareness (Social Justice module), all built on a foundation of art-making. ARCK's highly-qualified, trained teaching artists collaborate closely with classroom teachers to create customized lessons tied to academic objectives, with special attention to literacy and STEM concepts. Aiming to empower the next generation of problem solvers in a future increasingly impacted by climate change, we have since 2016 steadily increased our focus on sustainability as a major theme throughout all three modules. Over the course of our program, students break down barriers, understand and appreciate their own contributions, and gain global awareness.

How did we empower students to reach their greatest potential this year?

Student Growth:

Teaching artists and classroom teachers, along with ARCK's staff, observed students on Social-Emotional Learning, Academics, and Art Integration, based on a scale from 1-5 for each outcome. During and after, teaching artists and classroom teachers filled out a survey to rate their students. The overall growth in each core outcome area is as follows:

Social Emotional Learning and Arts Integration

- Numerous students grew in their writing skills and math (STEAM concepts) due to the creative outlet that this project afforded.
- Students collaborated effectively with each other.
- The visual art projects created a motivational vehicle that encouraged students to express themselves in front of their peers and the community.
- Students worked together on several projects (quilts, sculptures, portraits, posters, printmaking, and murals on wall, paper, and wood) and had practice following multi-step directions.
- Most of the art was recyclable and sustainable!
- Students showed healthy emotional management skills.
- Students showed strong self-awareness.
- Students showed empathy towards their peers and their community, especially in the social justice module's "Design Thinking for Long Term Solutions" project.

OUTCOMES

"While learning in other disciplines may often focus on development of a single skill or talent, the arts regularly engage multiple skills and abilities. Engagement in the arts... nurtures the development of cognitive, social, and personal competencies."



How do we engage parents in their child's art education?

This year, parents and teachers at the Josiah Quincy Elementary School came together for a "Sewing" Party" to create community guilts by sewing together guilt squares designed by 5th grade students. With five sewing machines and around 100 squares to assemble, we temporarily turned the school library into a busy production environment. With help from ARCK's teaching artists, the group made great progress toward completing all six guilts, which will be given as a graduation gift to the school by the 5th grade class. Involving parents and families in their child's art making process helps fulfill ARCK's mission to address the whole child, and create a sense of community and inclusion through the arts. The Quincy Sewing Party also gave parents a chance to use their own creative skills, take a break from their normal routine, and get to know one another better. The six colorful guilts will be showcased in the auditorium of the Josiah Quincy Elementary School. By mobilizing parents and creating a welcoming space for engagement, we look beyond the classroom toward more supportive and inclusive communities.



SCHOOLS SERVED





Blackstone Innovation School South Fnd

ARCK has partnered with Blackstone for five years and served almost 400 students in grades 1-3, as well as a K-5 classroom of students of varying abilities. At our Parent Art Night at Blackstone. families were invited to view their children's showcased work and celebrate their arts-integrated accomplishments.

Gardner Pilot Academy Allston

We have served this school since the inception of our organization in 2012. Last academic year, we served students in grades 2, 5. 6 and 7. In the fall of 2017, approximately 80 students from GPA and Lilla G. Frederick participated in two significant public art installations. The first was a large-scale collaborative art installation, entitled "I AM...You," in City Hall Plaza during Boston's HUBWeek. Using fiber art, text, and projection on a shipping container, the work explored the themes of identity, community, and migration according to the students' own experiences and family histories.

Lilla G. Frederick Middle School Dorchester

Lilla G. Frederick 8th grade students collaborated with Gardner Pilot Academy students to create "Paredes Que Hablan" (Walls that Speak), a public mural displayed in the Bruce C. Bolling Building that incorporated students' own memoirs about identity and crossing borders.

Josiah Quincy Elementary School Chinatown

This school is where ARCK came to life in Fall of 2012! Over the course of this year's program, 5th grade students designed roughly 100 squares to create quilts to give to the school as a graduation gift. Students were asked to think about what symbols represented their classmates as a whole, with the globe, the school mascot, and handprints being some of their responses. In May 2018, teachers, teaching artists, and parents came together for a sewing party to stitch all of the students' squares together, making a total of six guilts! Turning the school library into a temporary work room with five sewing machines, parents joined in their child's artmaking process, exercised their own creativity, and interacted with other parents.

2017-2018 **Highlights**

"I AM...YOU" HUBWEEK







October 9 - 14, 2017

The installation, "I AM...You," was co-created by ARCK and approximately 80 7th grade students from Gardner Pilot Academy in Allston and the Lilla G. Frederick Pilot Middle School in Dorchester, using a shipping container at City Hall Plaza. Through fiber art, text, and projection, the work explored the role empathy plays in envisioning both our cultural identities and solutions to societal issues. The students' art installation invited viewer participation, challenging passers by to see themselves in the symbols of identity that students design and paint. As many ARCK students and families are immigrants, the project provided a platform for their voices to be heard in the wider Boston community.

"PAINT THE TOWN ROUGE" 6th Annual Benefit Gala









October 26, 2017

ARCK held its 6th annual auction benefit gala, "Paint the Town Rouge," on October 26th, 2017 at the Lenox Hotel from 7-11pm. The theme was Moulin Rouge and inspired by French artist Henri Toulouse de Lautrec. Guests wandered the streets of Paris and bid on artwork by locally and internationally distinguished artists, savored exquisite hors d'oeuvres and drinks, and danced the night away to raise funds for our arts integration programs. We raised \$118,500 through sponsorship, ticket sales, and auction purchases. Standout auction items this year included a "Coach's Assistant" package donated by the Red Sox, a serigraph by Dr. Seuss, and a Gibson Les Paul Tribute Guitar. At the gala, we presented Jessica Hoffmann Davis, Founder of Harvard's Arts in Education master's program with our ARCK's Global Citizenship Award. Two classroom teachers at our partner schools, Blackstone Innovation School and Gardner Pilot Academy, received the new Above & Beyond Award, which recognizes exceptional dedication to implementing ARCK's program in their classrooms.

"PAREDES QUE HABLAN"




February 22 - March 2, 2018

The mural, "Paredes Que Hablan" (Walls that Speak), was created by approximately 80 7th grade students from Gardner Pilot Academy in Allston and Lilla G. Frederick Pilot Middle School in Dorchester. This work was a collaboration between ARCK and the students and teachers of GPA and Frederick. In the creation of this mural, students considered and experimented with how the themes and topics from our reading and writing in the Borders and Identity Unit could be represented in symbols. Each student created a symbol, and then a group of student artists met on a Saturday morning to join as many symbols as they could into an integrated design that conveyed the class's message about border crossing. Then, all students traced the design onto mural panels and painted the panels.




Laura Godfrey, Community Advisor
